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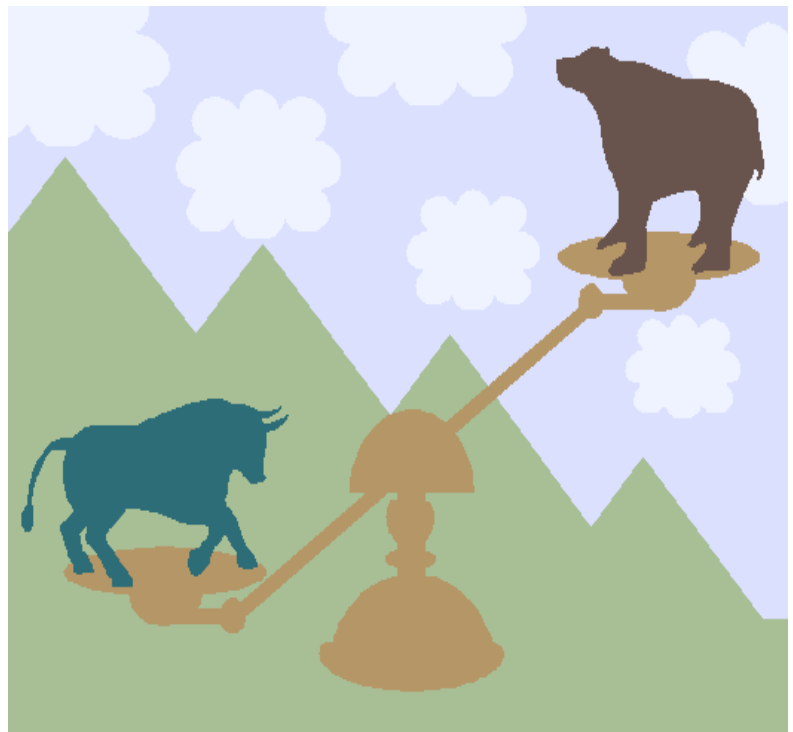

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WHEAT



ANALYSIS

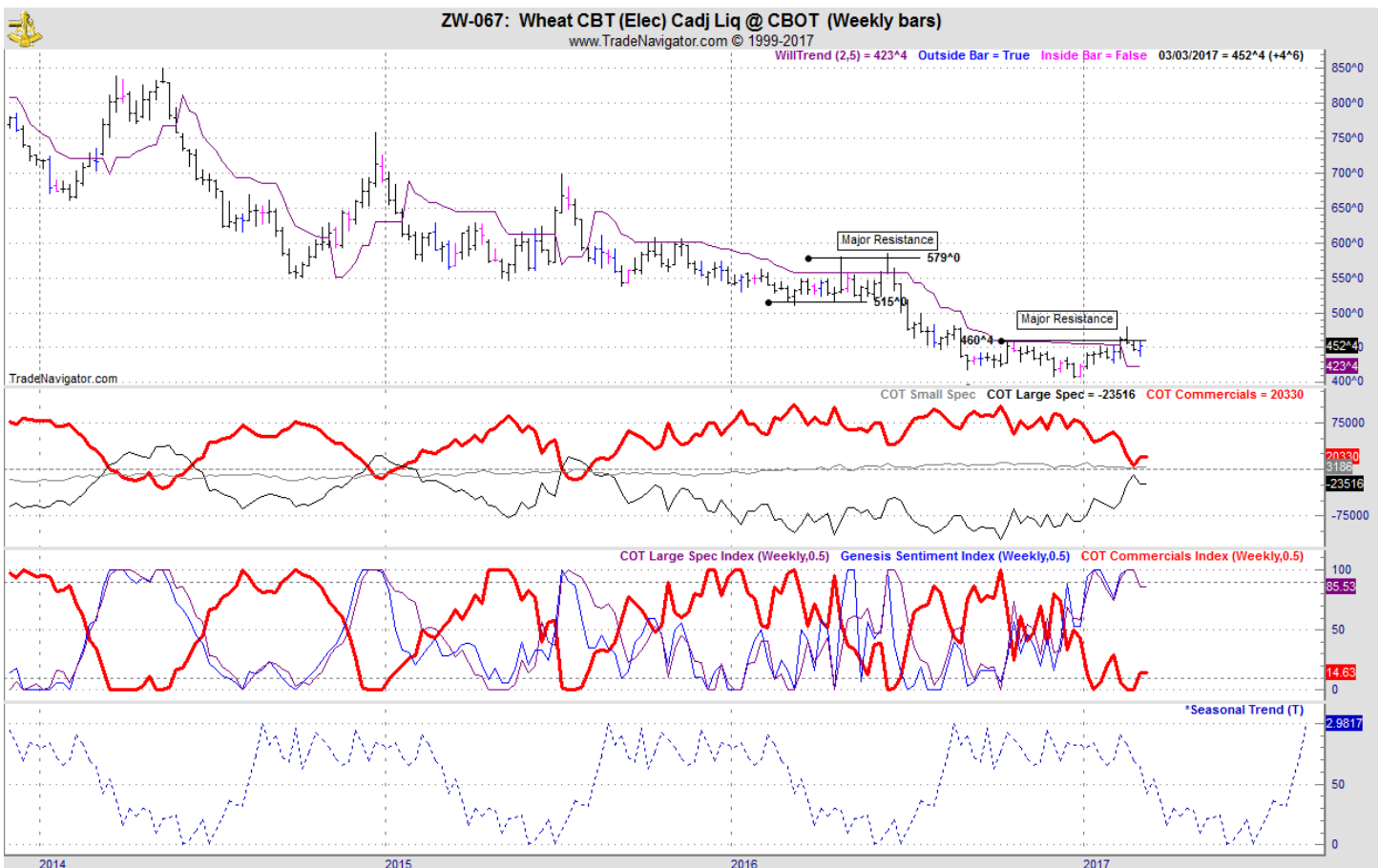
For the week, Chicago wheat closed \$.04 3/4 higher; Kansas City wheat closed \$.04 3/4 higher and Minneapolis wheat \$.06 lower. Last week, exporters did not announce any private sales.

Weekly export sales for the week ending February 16 showed 26.0 mb of wheat. Annual wheat sales are 896 mb, up 38% from the previous year. Plains monthly conditions pegged 43% of the Kansas wheat crop g/e, down 1% from last month with Oklahoma showing 10% improvement to 43% g/e. Nebraska ratings fell 3% to 44% while Texas ratings were up 4% to 34% g/e. In the month of March, growing conditions for the U.S. winter wheat will be the main driving force for prices. The winter wheat crop that is lying dormant makes up approximately 67% of our exportable wheat. Winter wheat's growing cycle begins by the end of March and the market will remain sensitive to weather issues. Remember, the better the conditions of the crop will translate into better quality of wheat and attract foreign demand, eventually leading to a demand driven bull market following the winter wheat harvest. Expect short-covering ahead of the planting intentions report at the end of the month. Spring wheat futures, traded on the Minneapolis Grain Exchange, should find strength into the planting intentions report as the market will bid against corn and soybeans for seeded acres this spring.

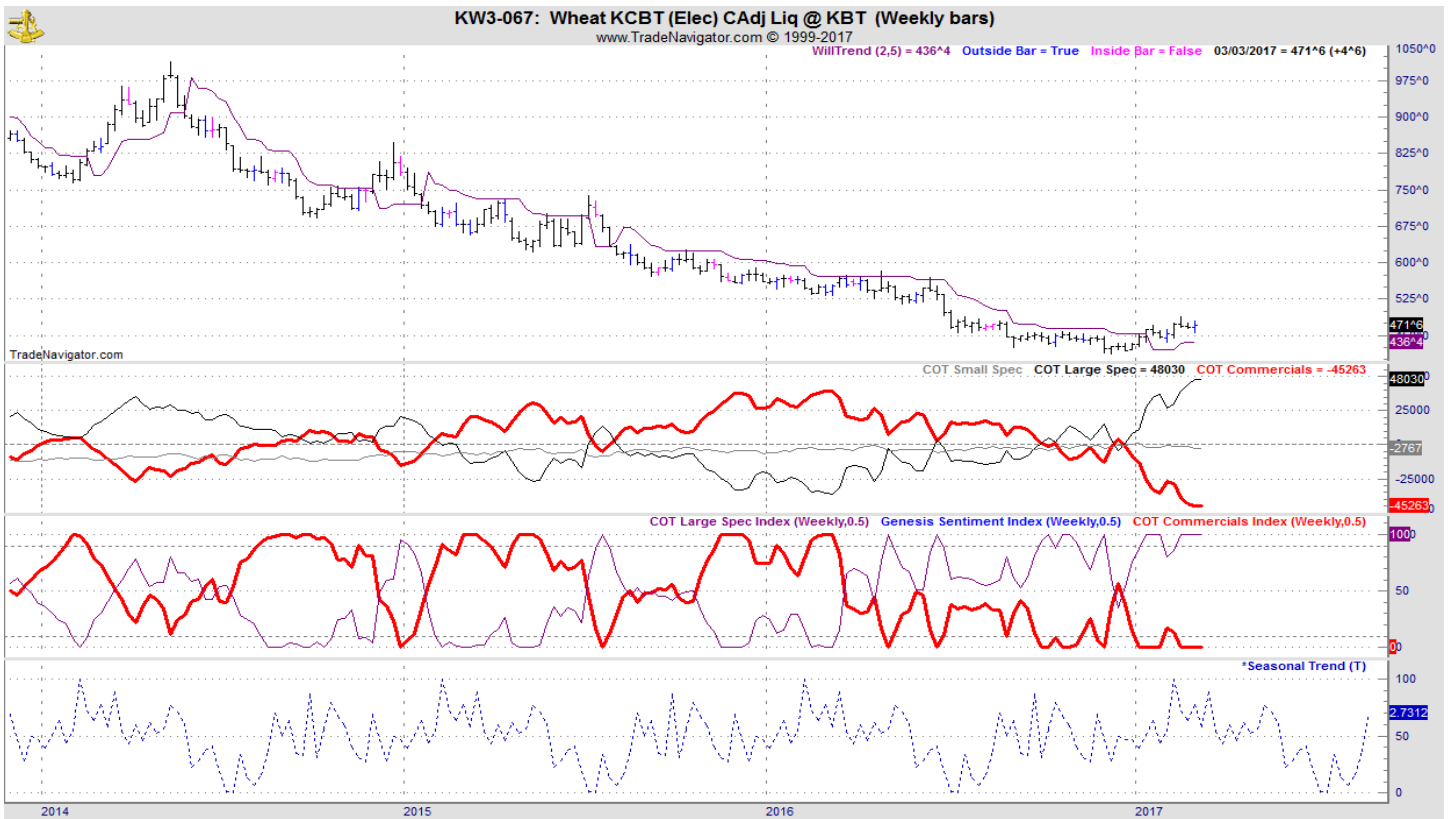
STRATEGY & OUTLOOK

Wheat futures are rallying into resistance which is a great time to make sales of old crop and turn attention to new crop marketing.

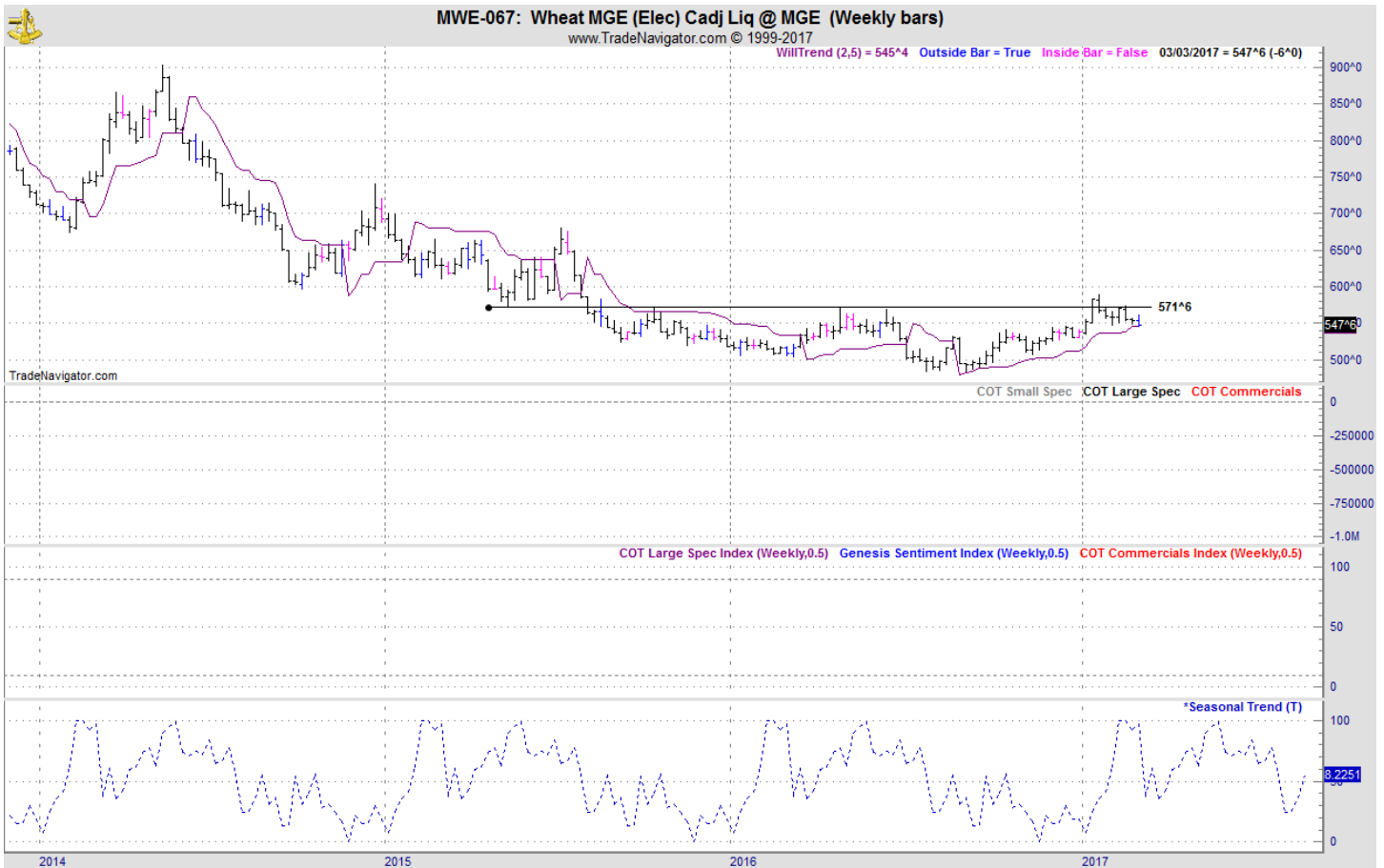
WEEKLY CHICAGO
