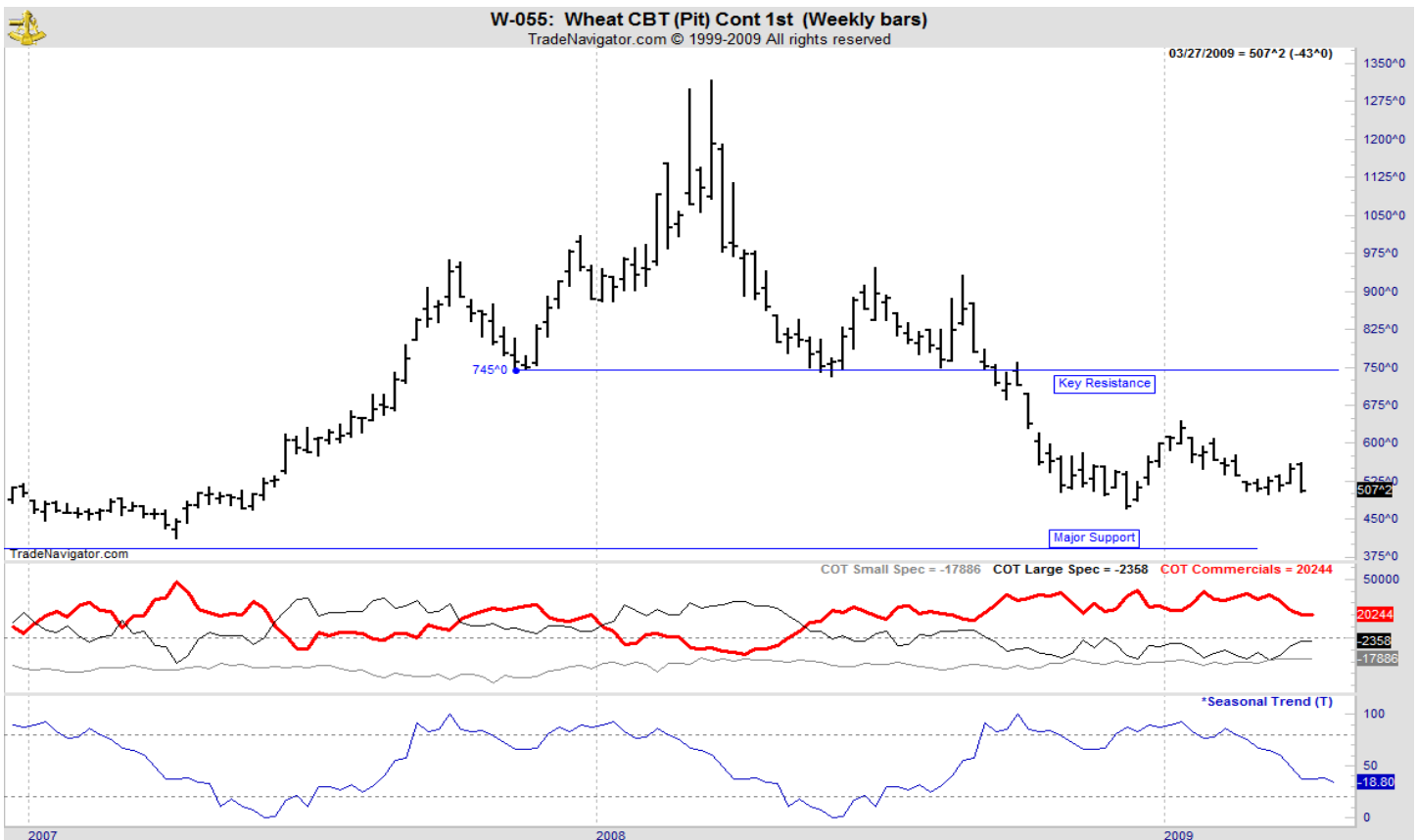
ANALYSIS

For the week, Chicago wheat closed \$.43 lower; Kansas City wheat \$.53 lower and Minneapolis wheat \$.28 lower. The weekly export sales report showed net sales of 264,200 metric tons were up 24 percent from the previous week, but down 20 percent from the prior 4-week average. Increases reported for Japan (96,000 MT), Egypt (69,600 MT, including 60,000 MT switched from unknown destinations), Indonesia (63,700 MT, including 58,000 MT switched from unknown destinations), Nigeria (35,700 MT), Venezuela (30,500 MT), South Korea (23,000 MT), and Haiti (18,300 MT, including 18,000 MT switched from unknown destinations), were partially offset by decreases for unknown destinations (152,500 MT), Guatemala (10,300 MT), and Nicaragua (3,000 MT). Net sales of 124,000 MT for delivery in 2009/10 were for the Philippines (59,500 MT), unknown destinations (58,000 MT), and Nicaragua (6,500 MT). This year's U.S. wheat sales stand at 76% compared to last year's strong sale performance with commitments of 923 mb this year vs. 1,199 mb a year ago. The U.S. only needs to export 5.2 mb each week to reach the USDA forecast. Demand is now on the backburner of price direction as traders are now focused on the weather forecasts in the winter plains. The Texas Plains remains extremely dry, but heavy snowfall was dumped over much of the winter wheat belt last weekend. The USDA is now issuing crop condition ratings on a weekly basis for the winter wheat crop as it has broken dormancy in many locations. The USDA rated the Kansas wheat crop at 43% g/e, up 1% from last week; Oklahoma at 24% g/e, down 1%; while Texas is rated at 13% g/e, up 1%.

STRATEGY & OUTLOOK

Producers should have over 50% of their 2008 crop sold and/or hedged. The other 50% should be sold in 10% increments on a spring rally if KC can rally to the \$6.25 to \$6.75 range. New crop hedges should be placed once July KC wheat can reach the \$6.30 to \$6.80 range.

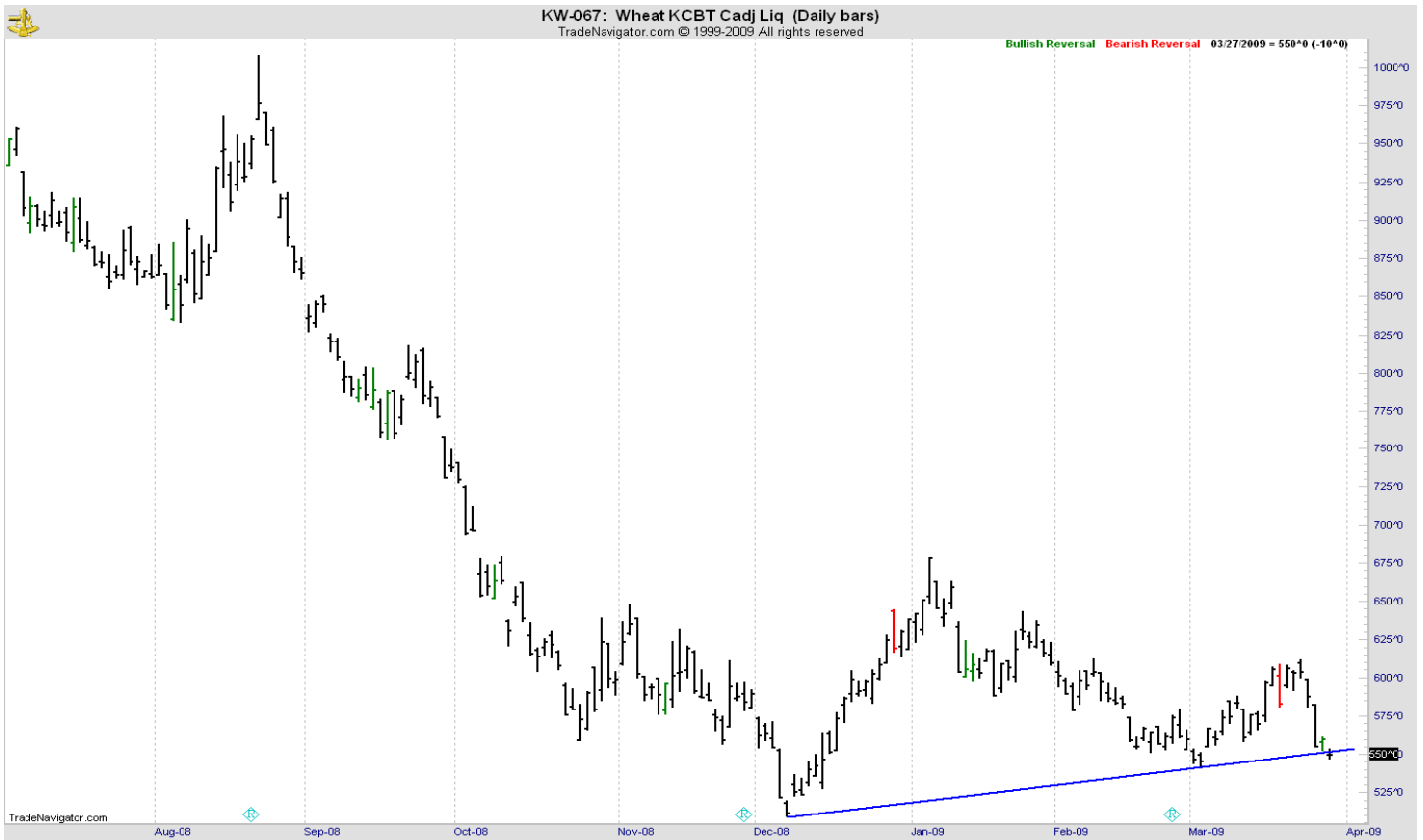
CHICAGO WHEAT



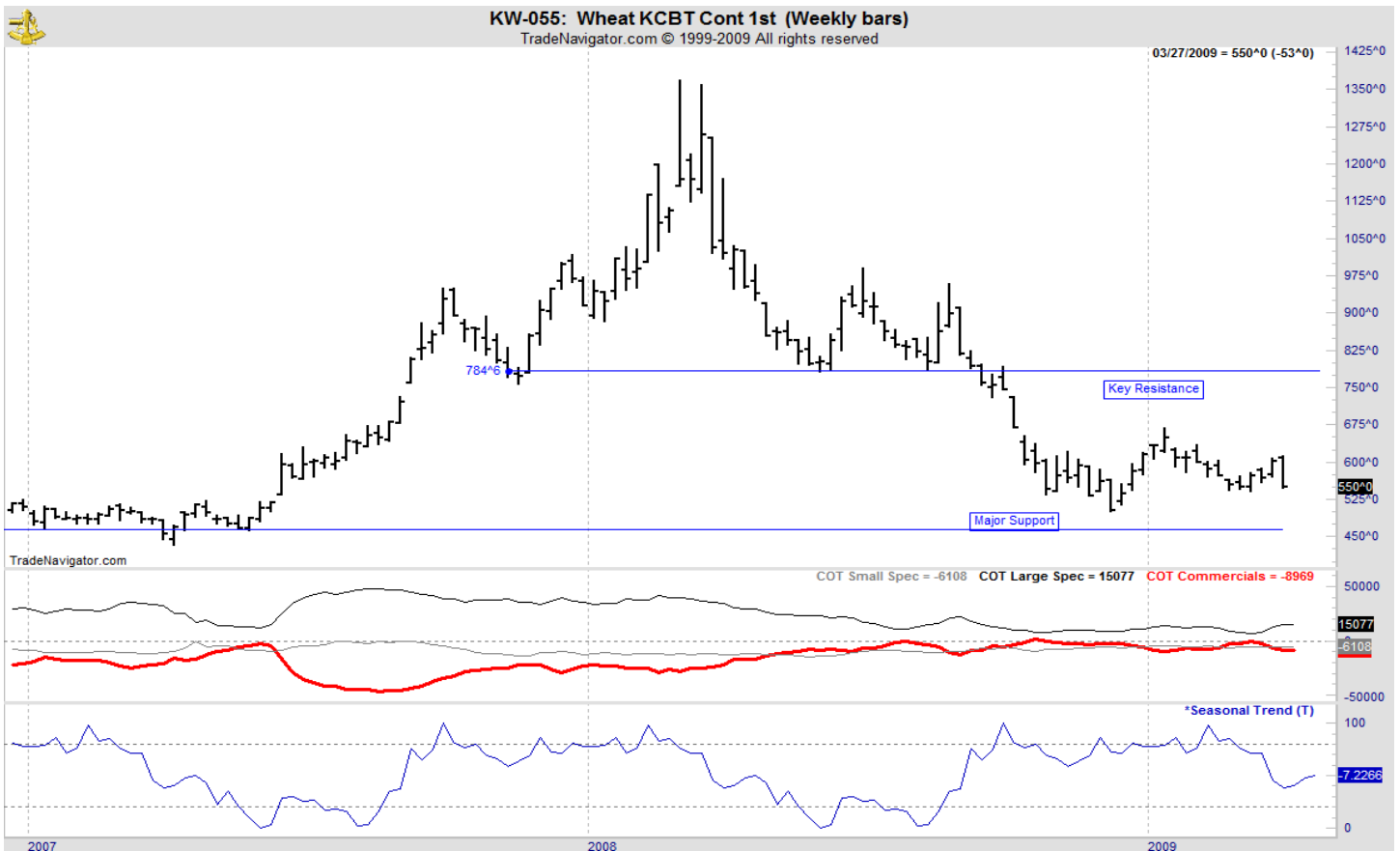

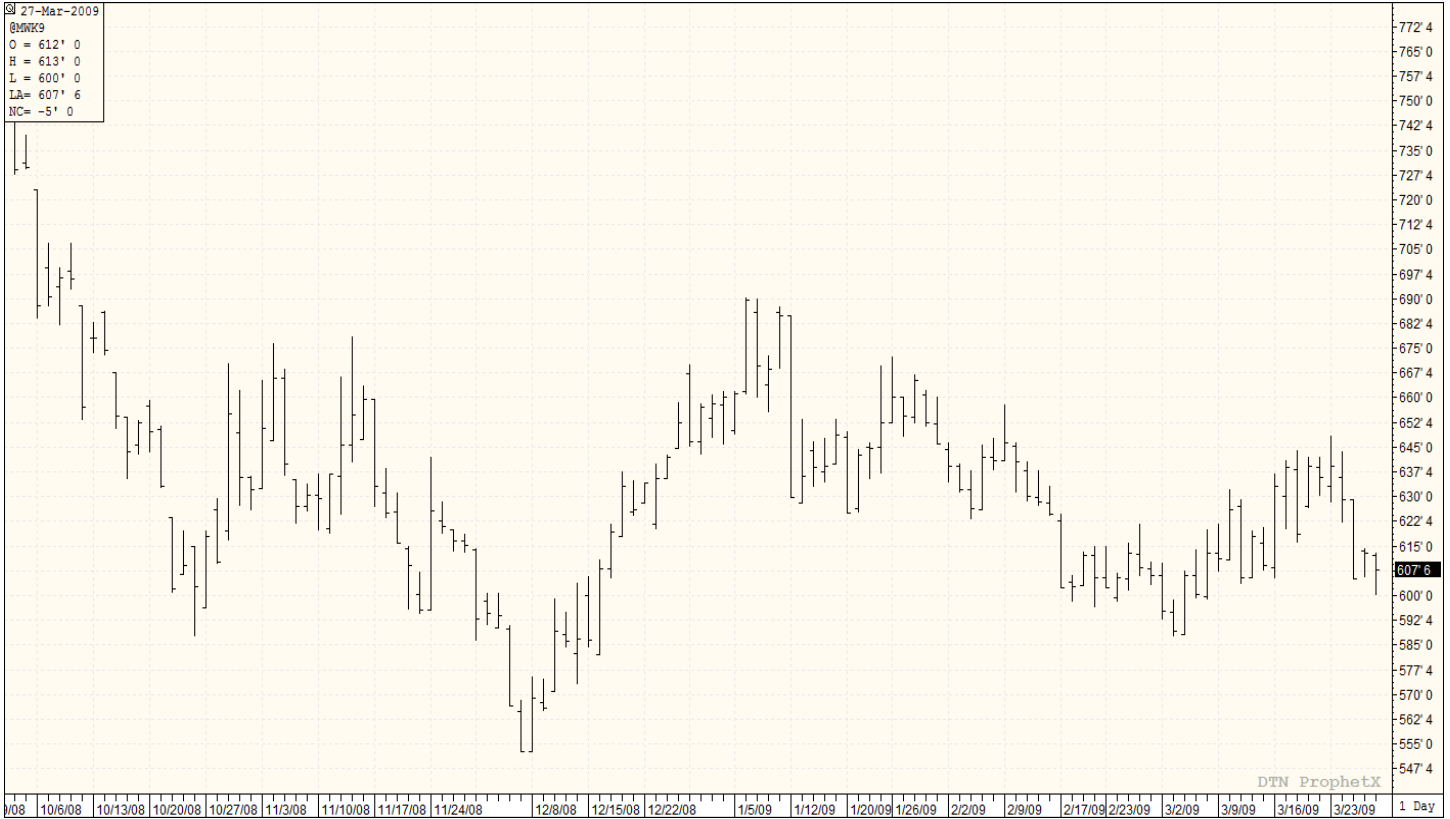
KANSAS CITY WHEAT
